What is Phonics?

- Phonics is a way of teaching children how to read and write.
- It helps children hear, identify and use different sounds that distinguish one word from another in the English language







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You may hear your children say....

-phonics (also known as 'synthetic phonics') - The teaching of reading by developing awareness of the sounds in words and the corresponding letters used to represent those sounds.

phoneme - Any one of the 44 sounds which make up words in the English language.

-grapheme - How a phoneme is written down. There can be more than one way to spell a phoneme. E.g-the phoneme 'ay' is spelt differently in each of the words 'way', 'make', 'fail', 'great', 'sleigh' and 'lady'.

-blending - Putting together the sounds in a word in order to read it, e.g. 'f - r - o - g, grog'

-segmenting - Breaking a word into sounds in order to spell them, e.g. frog, frog, frog, frog, frog, frog, frog

-Digraph- 2 letters making one sound

-Trigraph- 3 letters making one sound




Your child may come home with a sticker with a digraph or word on it. Please ask them what it says! It will have been from their phonics lesson and they will have been practicing it during the day to help embed the knowledge.

What is the Year I phonics screening check?

- The phonics screening check will be taken individually by all children in Year I in England.
- It is designed to give teachers and parents information on how your child is progressing in phonics.
- It will help to identify whether your child needs additional support at this stage so that they do not fall behind in this vital early reading skill.

How is the Screening Test conducted?

There will be two sections in the 40-word check. Your child will read up to jour words per page for their teacher and they will probably do the check in one sitting of about 5-10 minutes.



When does the Phonics Screening Check take place?

The Year I screening will take place throughout the week beginning Monday 6th June. The children cannot retake the test at any other time so it is very important your child is in school during this week.






Once children have a secure knowledge of a number of







How do we decide which books children read?

Children are assessed, then LW matches which books should be allocated for their secure phonic knowledge.

Children will be allocated a Reading Practice Ebook(after reading it 3 times in school)

Share the front cover page before reading - this covers sounds and words contained in the book.

Celebrate, praise, talk about the Ebook with you child.



Is this a fletten or non-fletton book? (non-fletsen)

 Now read the book. Enjoy looking at the pictures and talking about them.


Supporting at home. Reading for pleasure books

To become lifelong readers, it is essential that they read for pleasure


Children may not be able to read this book independently but these books offer a wealth of opportunities for talking about the pictures and enjoying the story or information text.
